### WELCOME TO WEST SEATTLE - BEACHTOWN GETAWAY

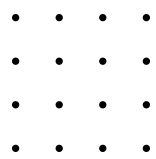

For an extraordinary selection of tap beers and bottles, The Beer Junction is a must-visit. This tap house features over 1,300 types of cold beer and an equally chilled atmosphere. 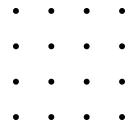
